Foreword

This Malaysian Standard was developed by the Working Group on Halal Cosmetics under the authority of the Industry Standards Committee on Halal Standards.

Major modifications in this revision are as follows:

- a) the number and title of this Malaysian Standard have been changed to “MS 2634, *Halal cosmetics - General requirements*”;
- b) definition of “personal care” is merged as “cosmetics”;
- c) incorporation of definition on “halal competent authority”, “manufacturing and handling”, “non-halal”, “*fatwa*” and “*sertu*”;
- d) introduction of requirements on Halal integrity, record management, religious practise and staff participation in “Management responsibility”;
- e) amendment and improvement on various clauses for clarity.

This Malaysian Standard cancels and replaces MS 2200-1:2008, *Islamic Consumer Goods - Part 1: Cosmetic and Personal Care - General Guidelines*.
